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Executive Summary

This report, *Let's All Play Community Engagement Outcomes Report*, outlines the community's ideas and aspirations generated during the community engagement period from 1 to 28 February 2019.

The community's and Let's All Play Committee's contributions will inform the new 'Let's All Play Strategy', focusing on inclusive well-designed, diverse and high value outdoor play spaces to attract and capture people of all ages and abilities whilst responding to changing demographics and increases in population density.

Over the past 10 years Council has invested over \$6 million in outdoor play equipment based on innovative design, community engagement and shifting community needs, while also minimising maintenance burden:

- 32 playground renewals
- 6 new playgrounds to meet population growth and density
- 1 outdoor fitness centre
- improvements to Five Dock Skate Park

The City of Canada Bay continues to attract new residents, with population expected to grow by 29 per cent to 113,560 residents in 2031. The largest growth will be in the over 65 years old age group (54 per cent growth representing 18 per cent of the community) and children aged 5-14 years old (37 per cent growth representing 11 per cent of the community).

Appendix I: Outdoor Play Spaces Audit summarises the existing outdoor play spaces and community demographics.

Thematic Key Findings

Theme

Soft fall

Key Findings

The community were asked their preferred situations for the soft-fall surfaces outlined below in relation to playgrounds and outdoor fitness equipment. These key findings include respondents who support the type of ground surface but not only in relation to playgrounds and/or outdoor fitness equipment.

rubber soft fall: 96% of adults support rubber soft fall with playgrounds (96%) and outdoor fitness equipment (13%) as the most preferred situations of community members who support rubber soft fall

synthetic grass: 73% of adults support synthetic grass with sports fields / cricket nets (26%) and playgrounds (16%) as the most preferred situations of community members who support synthetic grass

sand: 64% of adults support sand with playgrounds (43%) and only contained sand pit (22%) as the most preferred situations of community members who support sand

bark mulch/pine bark chip: 49% of adults support bark mulch/pine bark chip with 'limited to garden beds/under trees only' (72%) and nature play (22%) as the most preferred situations of community members who support bark mulch/pine bark

natural grass: 95% of adults support natural grass with playgrounds (43%) and large open spaces (34%) as the most preferred situations of community members who support natural grass

Shade

Adults

Playgrounds designed for children aged under 11 years old, survey respondents:

- natural shade (trees): 79% very important; 16% important
- shade cloth: 76% very important; 18% important
- sheltered picnic tables: 50% very important; 34% important

Youth (aged 8 to 19 years old)

sheltered picnic tables: 69% very important; 23% important

Young Children (aged 2 to 10 years old)

activities in a sheltered picnic tables: 33% included as one of the four most important experiences they aspired to in parks

The top four definitions of inclusive play:

- a space that can be used by all ages and ability - 32% of survey respondents
- a range of opportunities for all ages to swing, climb and slide - 23% of survey respondents

Inclusive play

- more sports courts/fields for general community use - 10% of survey respondents
- good accessibility/pathways for prams, wheelchairs and walking frames - 8% of survey respondents
- outdoor fitness equipment including adjacent to playgrounds - 8% of survey respondents

Youth

- 20% of respondents recognised the need for facilities for all abilities and all ages
- 40% stated that parks should be designed to support a variety of uses

Adults

- Survey opportunities for nature play:
 - ranked number 1 in importance for outdoor place activity: 53% very important; 29% important
 - ranked number 2 in likelihood of use by a household member: 73% very likely; 16% not likely
- Ideas wall wild nature playground was posted as an an idea and attracted 17 individual votes

Youth

- **Survey** opportunities for nature play: 54% of youth stated they were very likely to use parks with nature play; 15% stated they were likely to use; 23% stated they were unlikely to use; and 8% stated they would never use
- Ideas wall hedge maze was posted as an idea and aftracted 19 individual votes

Wild and nature play

Theme Outdoor fitness equipment

Key Findings

Adults

- ranked 3rd least important in importance for outdoor place activity: 34% very important; 28% not important
- ranked 2nd lowest in likelihood of use by a household member: 35% not likely; 8% never
- 59% of survey respondents indicated the top five outdoor fitness equipment items they would utilise in a park.

the three most popular:

- sit-up bench 54%
- stepping platform 54%
- pull up bars 48%

the three least popular

- magnetic training 13%
- hand cycle 15%
- tai chi station 15%

Youth

- 46% of survey respondents stated they were very likely to use outdoor fitness centres, however, 31% stated they were not likely to use outdoor fitness centres
- 43% of male survey respondents stated they were unlikely to use outdoor fitness centres

Adults stated they were most likely to use

- Zip line / Flying Fox 79% of respondents
- Ninja obstacle course 67% of respondents
- Interactive (eg: sound, art and light) sculptures that allow climbing - 64% of respondents
- Outdoor rock/wall climbing 59% of respondents

Adults stated they were least likely to

Badminton court - 17% of respondents Volleyball court - 29% of respondents Table tennis - 39% of respondents

The five most popular ideas posted on the ideas wall included:

- Wild Nature Playground 17 votes
- Full size basketball court around at Drummoyne Park - 13 votes
- A well designed basketball court with cover - 10 votes
- Wangal Park Access and Playground -7 votes
- Hopscotch 7 votes

42% of survey respondents stated there is a lack of play equipment for my household and/or my stage of life and/ or gender

31% of survey respondents stated their is a lack of activities in which I am interested in

a suggestion put forward at the Seniors Workshop included creating a lawn games hub with club house and associated facilities

Youth

Youth stated they were most likely to use

- Ninja obstacle course 85% of respondents
- Zip line / Flying Fox 85% of respondents
- Table tennis, Handball court, Outdoor rock/wall climbing, Basketball - 77% of respondents

Youth stated they were least likely to use

- Skatepark 31% of respondents
- Badminton court 31% of respondents
- Volleyball court 38% of respondents

The survey results largely supported the ideas posted by youth on the ideas wall

- Basketball courts received 34 votes
- Mini ninja obstacle course received 28 votes
- Handball court received 27 votes
- Balloon trampoline received 26 votes
- Outdoor volleyball court received 26 votes
- Ninja obstacle course with slide and water play - received 13 votes Giant slides - received 10 votes
- Skate park received 8 votes

62% of youth stated there was equipment at local parks they were interested in using

85% of youth stated they were likely to use parks with large open spaces to encourage informal sports activity including flying a kite and kicking a ball

54% of youth stated they were likely to use playgrounds designed for children 8-11 years (mean age of youth survey respondents was 14 years old)

Facilities for different age ranges

Theme

Key Findings

Adults

In relation to outdoor fitness equipment, comments were largely supporting more static equipment over dynamic equipment. The top five mentioned comments:

- muscle beach style static workout areas are good (pull up bars, sit up benches) / using your body weight - 11% of respondents
- fitness equipment for all ages and abilities (both static and dynamic) -5% of respondents
- 3. fitness equipment for all ages and abilities 5% of respondents
- 4. ninja warrior course 4%of respondents
- 5. climbing wall 3% of respondents

Stationary and dynamic equipment

The above also aligns with the outdoor fitness equipment survey respondents would most likely use.

In relation to 'play' equipment, 54% of comments were about dynamic equipment.. The top five mentioned comments:

- climbing frames / frames (static) -15% of respondents
- 2. swings (dynamic) 15% of respondents
- 3. a mix of dynamic and static 14% of respondents
- 4. flying foxes / zip line (dynamic) 12% of respondents
- 5. slides (static) 9% of respondents

Youth

Contributions provided by youth was largely in relation the importance of static equipment including basketball courts, ninja obstacle courses, hand ball courts, netball courts, balloon trampolines etc.

The most popular dynamic equipment supported by youth was:

- Water Play: 85% of youth respondents stated they were very likely to use parks in which water play was included
- Zipline / flying fox: 85% of youth respondents stated they were very likely to use parks which featured ziplines / flying foxes
- Nature Play: 54% of youth stated they were very likely to use parks with nature play; 15% stated they were likely to use

Young ChildrenFour of the five

Four of the five most popular play equipment items selected by children were dynamic:

- 1. Swings 70% of respondents
- 2. Modern combo unit (static) - 64% of respondents
- 3. Carousel-57% of respondents Water Play / Falling Water 56% of respondents
- 4. See-saw 55% of respondents

The five least popular play equipment items selected by children were stationary:

- 1. Springer 33% of respondents
- 2. Tunnel 35% of respondents
- 3. Stepping Tyres -37% of respondents
- 4. Cubby House 38%
- 5. Rocket 41% of respondents

In 1928, the American National Recreation Association proposed guidelines recommending equipment for children that was appropriate to their age levels:

- preschool playground should have a sandbox, chair swings, a small slide, and a piece of simple low climbing equipment;
- elementary school playground should have a horizontal ladder, a balance beam, a giant stride (a large wheel placed at the top of a pole with chains hanging down to permit children to grasp on and swing as the wheel turns), swings, a slide, a horizontal bar, seesaws, and other low climbing equipment.

Traditional versus modern equipment

Interestingly, respondents overall support play equipment which is 'traditional' however modern materials such as rubber soft-fall are highly favoured:

- Challenging activities eg: climbing, balance, monkey bars, ninja courses, hopscotch: 65% stated very important and 30% stated important
- Traditional playground design combination of low risk with more challenging component: 59% stated very important and 30% stated important
- Nature play (providing opportunity to connect and interact with nature eg: big rocks, large loose sticks, sand, streams, climbing trees, timber tree houses etc): 59% stated very important and 30% stated important
- Modern playground design reduced risk designed: 42% stated very important and 31% stated important

Young Children

The four most popular experiences selected by young children were largely traditional:

- Kicking a Ball -53% of children
- Scootering -53% of children
- Flying 48% of children
- Climbing Trees -43% of children

Theme

Water play

Key Findings

Adults

- ranked equal 4th in importance for outdoor place activity: 43% very important; 36% important
 - ranked 3rd in likelihood of use by a household membér: 71% very likely; 20% not likely

Youth

- 85% of survey respondents stated they were very likely to use parks in which water play was included
- Ninja Obstacle Course with giant slides and water activities was an idea posted on the ideas wall. The fourteen year old female who posted the idea stated it would provide fitness competitiveness, engaging activities and being in the outdoors rather than being in a gym. The idea was supported by 13 individuals.

Young Children

- 73% of children included one or more stickers depicting water play
- 56% of children included a sticker depicting water play equipment with water sprinkling down
- 54% of children included a sticker depicting water play equipment with water with a upwards spray

Adults

The most important (important to very important) infrastructure to support visitation and use of parks:

• Public Toilets - 96% of respondents

- Public Bins 96% of respondents
- Good cycling and pedestrian access to parks - 91% of respondents
- Drinking Fountain 90% of respondents
- Park Lighting 85% of respondents
- Sheltered Picnic Tables 84% of respondents

The least important infrastructure to support visitation and use of parks:

- Free Wi-Fi only 32% considered this important
- BBQs only 57% consider this important

Youth

The most important (important to very important) infrastructure to support visitation and use of parks:
Public Bins - 100% of respondentsSheltered Picnic Tables - 92% of

- respondents
- Picnic Tables 92% respondents
- Public Toilets 85% of respondents
- Park Lighting 85% of respondents
- Good cycling and pedestrian access to parks - 85% of respondents

The least important infrastructure to youth:

- BBQs only 46% consider this important
- Free Wi-Fi only 62% considered this important

Associated park infrastructure

Playgrounds designed for children under 11 years old

The most important (important to very important) infrastructure to support visitation and use of playgrounds for young children:

- Bins 98% of respondents
- Access to a public toilet- 97% of respondents
- Natural shade (trees) 95% of respondents
- Access to a drinking fountain 94% of respondents
- Shade cloth 94% of respondents

The least important infrastructure to support visitation and use of playgrounds for young children:

- Non-fenced playground 32% considered this important (note, 81% considered fenced playgrounds to be very important/important)
- Picnic Tables 78% considered this important




Figure 1: Traffic sources to both online engagement pages

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


Figure 2: Traffic sources to letsallplay.com.au









How often do you visit parks?








What are the three parks you most frequently visit?




What are the key reasons you visit these parks?












Outdoor softfall surfaces: Please indicate in which situations you support the following soft-fall surfaces for playgrounds and outdoor fitness equipment.






Rubber soft-fall preferred situations




Synthetic grass preferred situations








Figure 2: Traffic sources to online engagement page

Youth Community Engagement Findings



Of the 117 community members who participated in the Youth consultation, 34 provided qualitative feedback. This feedback including the support of ideas posted online by young people is summarised under core themes set out below:

Visitation

The principle reasons survey respondents visited parks and recreation spaces were:

- spending time with family and friends 85% of survey respondents
- being active 77% of survey respondents
- having 'time out' 69% of survey respondents
- sport 54% of survey respondents

Survey respondents visited parks:

- a few times a week 46% of survey respondents
- once a week 23% of survey respondents
- rarely 31% of survey respondents

83% of survey respondents who visit parks a few times a week reside in an apartment or semi-detached / townhouse

Inclusive Play

Survey respondents provided comments on what inclusive play means to them and how could Council design outdoor play spaces to be inclusive:

- 40% stated that parks should be designed to support a variety of uses
- 20% stated that play spaces should be designed to be all abilities and/or ages

Nature Play

- Survey opportunities for nature play: 54% of youth stated they were very likely to use parks with nature play; 15% stated they were likely to use; 23% stated they were unlikely to use; and 8% stated they would
- Ideas wall hedge maze was posted as an idea and attracted 19 individual votes

Outdoor Fitness Equipment

- 46% of survey respondents stated they were very likely to use outdoor fitness centres, however, 31% stated they were not likely to use outdoor fitness centres
- 43% of male survey respondents stated they were unlikely to use outdoor fitness centres

Water Play

- 85% of survey respondents stated they were very likely to use parks in which water play was included
- Ninja Obstacle Course with giant slides and water activities was an idea posted on the ideas wall. The fourteen year old female who posted the idea stated it would provide fitness competitiveness, engaging activities and being in the outdoors rather than being in a gym. The idea was supported by 13 individuals.

Associated Park Infrastructure

Through the survey, overall the most important (important to very important) infrastructure to support visitation and use of parks was:

- Public Bins 100% of respondents
- Sheltered Picnic Tables 92% of respondents
- Picnic Tables 92% respondents
- Public Toilets 85% of respondents
- Park Lighting 85% of respondents
- Good cycling and pedestrian access to parks 85% of respondents

The least important infrastructure to youth was:

- BBQs only 46% consider this important
- Free Wi-Fi only 62% considered this important

For respondents aged 8 to 11 years old, the most and least important infrastructure to support visitation and use of parks was:

- Public Bins and Good cycling and pedestrian access to parks: 100% considered these elements as important
- Free Wi-Fi: 100% considered this as not important

For respondents aged 12 to 15 years old, the most and least important infrastructure to support visitation and use of parks was:

- Sheltered Picnic Tables, Picnic Tables and Public Bins: 100% considered these elements as important
- Free Wi-Fi: 33% considered this as not important, however 50% stated this was important

For respondents aged 16 to 18 years old, the most and least important infrastructure to support visitation and use of parks was:

- Drinking Fountain, Public Bins, Public Toilets and Good cycling and pedestrian access to parks: 100% considered these elements as very important
- BBQs: 25% stated BBQs were not important, however 75% stated they were important to very important

In regards to barriers in visiting parks:

- 85% stated they would visit parks in the early evening if there was good lighting
- 85% stated that transport was not a barrier to visiting parks they are interested in
- 77% stated they do not only visit parks in which they can walk and/or ride bike/skateboard
- 62% stated existing equipment was not a barrier
- 62% stated they understood what they are allowed to and not allowed to do in parks
- 54% stated they did not wish to visit a park without toilets

Ideas Wall

The 2nd most popular idea posted on the ideas wall, with 29 votes, was relaxation stations with hammocks, bean bags and speakers for anyone who wants to socialise or simply relax.


