BACKGROUND

Following the trial of the Formosa Street and Church Street shared spaces from October 2020 to March 2021, Council has resolved to make these public spaces permanent. To deliver this project, Council has received a \$1M grant from the NSW Government as part of the Your High Street Program, which will be met with a \$2M contribution from the City of Canada Bay.

Community feedback collected throughout the pilot period has been used to create concept designs for both spaces. These designs were presented to the community for further feedback and results are summarised in this report.

This consultation ran from 9 – 31 August 2021.

CONSULTATION METHODS

- 2 x surveys on Collaborate (one for each space)
- 2 x online Q&A sessions (one for each space). These Q&A sessions were organised as face-toface drop-in sessions, however were not permitted due to the stay-at-home orders in place in Greater Sydney.
- Feedback via phone and email

NOTIFICATION METHODS

The following methods were implemented to notify the community of this consultation:

- Notification letter delivered to approx. 1,280 residences and businesses (see appendix A)
- 4 x stickers displayed on site signage (see appendix B)
- Collaborate project page
- Social media posts on Facebook and Instagram (see appendix C)

CONSULTATION SUMMARY

- 663 page views
- 409 unique visitors
- 43 people following the project for updates



Online Q&A sessions

- 10 people registered for the Formosa Street Q&A
- 11 people registered for the Church Street Q&A

RESULTS

- The online surveys received 121 contributions from 76 contributors, with many contributors completing the surveys for both spaces
- 2 pieces of feedback were received via email
- Formosa Street and Church Street Q&A sessions were attended by 4 and 7 community members, respectively.

Results for each shared space are summarised below.

Formosa Street

Survey

56 submissions were received through this online survey. Of these:

- 77% of respondents live in Drummoyne
- 2% of respondents own a business in Drummoyne
- 91% of respondents visited the space during the pilot period

Additional comments relating to design

Respondents had the option to provide additional comments on the design. Comments about the design which were mentioned more than once are listed below:

• Visual appeal (7) – make the area appealing by increasing planting and removing overhead powerlines

• Safety (5) – concerns relating to nearby traffic, paving and seating options given small children will be moving around the space

Additional comments relating to use of the space

Comments about the use of the space which were mentioned more than once are listed below:

- Activations (4) activities to bring people to the space
- Security (4) concerns relating to disruptive behaviour in the space at night

Other comments

- More children friendly options / play
- It would be nice to have a couple of restaurants/cafes in the space where CBA used to be.
- Ensure underground services are documented before the paving is laid to avoid spray painting on a finished area.
- Be careful with the height and density of trees used, it would be a shame if the space became so visually separated for the rest of the suburb.
- Deciduous trees could also be used for the canopy which will provide greater sunlight to the areas in the colder months
- Would be great to have some grass areas
- Please keep this space open for public use without any businesses allowed to operate in it unless (for example) as an occasional market

Online Q&A

This online Q&A was attended by 4 community members. Of these:

- 2 are business owners
- 2 are local residents

Feedback which relates to the design of the space:

• Moveable furniture would make it easier for local businesses to run events and activations in the space

Feedback which relates to the use of the space:

- Noise from activations must be mitigated to avoid disruption to nearby businesses
- Local businesses would welcome the opportunity to use the space for activations and promotion

Church Street

Survey

50 submissions were received through the online survey. Of these:

- 80% of respondents live in Drummoyne
- 8% of respondents own a business in Drummoyne
- 94% of respondents visited the space during the pilot period

Additional comments relating to design

Respondents had the option to provide additional comments on the design. Comments about the design which were mentioned more than once are listed below:

- Noise (4) when selecting play options, the needs of nearby residents must be considered as some cause excessive noise for nearby residents and businesses
- Safety (4) concerns relating to the proximity of passing traffic and a need for a solid fence or barrier on the Victoria Road side of the space
- Visual appeal (4) make the area appealing by increasing planting and removing overhead powerlines

Additional comments relating to use of the space

Comments about the use of the space which were mentioned more than once are listed below:

- Security (5) concerns over disruptive behaviour in the space at night
- Activations (2) to bring people to the space eg. outdoor cinema or activities for kids

Other comments

- The only design flaw is that I've noticed, is that the grease pit truck that empties/services the restaurants, will block the road to gain access via an extendable hose. Can you add a car spot for service trucks in the open space area? Maybe remove a car spot on the other side
- Please use native plants wherever possible.
- Wind protection necessary from Southerlies in Summer and Westerlies in Winter. If it could incorporate a toilet (like the one at Lyons Road end) and a water filing station on the outside that would be ideal. Raised gardens for the community to grow stocks of herbs or if not have

as many of the plantings as practicable be hardy edibles such as Rosemary for hedging; Oregano for ground cover; Parsley, curly for color and Mediterranean for height Lots of Sage for color contrast, Lillipillis anywhere

• If it is to be a family area smoking should not be permitted.

Online Q&A

This online Q&A was attended by 7 community members. Of these:

- 2 are business owners
- 4 are local residents
- 1 is a property owner but does not live nearby

Feedback which relates to the design of the space:

- Steps may be a trip hazard for children and older residents
- Design measures must reduce confusion for drivers, as cars are often seen entering Church Street from Victoria Road
- Specific play options (eg. table tennis and foosball) and activations cause excessive noise for nearby residents

Feedback which relates to the use of the space:

• Local businesses would welcome the opportunity to use the space for activations and promotion

Phone/email feedback

Two pieces of feedback were received via phone/email, both of which were outside the scope of this consultation.

CONCLUSION

The community is excited for the construction of these shared spaces and the opportunity they will bring for events and activations. For both the Formosa and Church Street spaces there was a general consensus as to which design options were preferred, with the preferred play options (chess, table tennis and hopscotch) and art themes (the environment, First Nations and Aboriginal art, and the foreshore) being consistent across both spaces.

Safety and noise mitigation are high priorities for the community, which should be considered as the design progresses. In particular, residents would like to ensure traffic barriers are extensive as both spaces border busy roads. Additional suggestions regarding the types of planting and play options were also put forward, along with ideas to improve the visual appeal of both spaces.

Other feedback received related to the use and management of the space which indicates further consultation would be beneficial closer to the construction period or opening of the spaces.



Earlier this year, we asked for your feedback on on two new public spaces we trialled in Formosa Street and Church Street, Drummoyne.


Following the trial from October 2020 to March 2021, Council has resolved to make these public spaces permanent.





























Trees (colour)


4. Which type of tree do you prefer in terms of the colour it will bring to the space? Multi Choice | Skipped: 2 | Answered: 48 (96%)




