1.1 Character, context and culture

Demographics

Concord West LCA investigation area is located east of Concord Road. The LCA investigation area sits adjacent to various green spaces including Yaralla Estate and Majors Bay Reserve. Yaralla Estate Conservation Area is located between the two LCA investigation area sites for Concord West. Major's Bay Town Centre and Concord Hospital are in proximity, with various public transport routes providing accessibility including Concord West station and bus services.

The age structure for Concord West demonstrates its nature as a quiet, established residential area with 22% of residents falling within the 35-49 age bracket. With the median age of 39, compared to 36 for Greater Sydney, and household size of 3, the character area is one that attracts young couples and growing families. The large percentage of separate house dwelling types indicate the character of the area as one that is low density, accommodating for 4 or more people.

Character and culture

Concord West was under the jurisdiction of Concord Council, until it was amalgamated with Drummoyne Council in 2000 to form the City of Canada Bay. The surrounding parish is also named Concord Parish.

A major historical figure was Thomas Walker (1804–1886), a philanthropist who lived in the Victorian Italianate mansion, Yaralla, on the shores of Parramatta River. Upon his death, Walker left substantial funds for the establishment of a convalescent hospital in the area. Since the late 1970s, it has functioned as the Rivendell Child, Adolescent and Family Unit, which specialises in the treatment of young people with psychological problems.

Walker's philanthropic work was continued by his daughter Dame Eadith Walker (1861–1937). The family home, Yaralla, eventually became the Dame Eadith Walker Hospital. Dame Eadith was also a key figure in the establishment of the Concord Repatriation General Hospital as it is known today.



1.2 Context Analysis

Streets and interface



Key findings

- Setbacks remain relatively generous across the LCA investigation area, with much of the development set back by at least 4m, allowing for fairly consistent streetscapes despite the variations in residential character.
- Wide, well-maintained verges can be found throughout Concord West, lending a spacious, comfortable character to many of the streets.

Movement and access



Key findings

- The LCA investigation area investigation area is comprised of a network of quiet, local streets.
- Public transport is limited to the main roads on the eastern and western borders of the LCA investigation area, more specifically along Concord Road where a number of bus stops can be found.
- Wide verges and footpaths are generally present on both sides of the street, which are conducive to pedestrian activity.

- The LCA investigation area contains small pockets of intact Federation and Californian Bungalows, however these are often interrupted by recent residential development.

Observations:

The evolution of the character area in recent history is shown through historic aerial imagery, from 1955, 1986 and 2021 respectively. Between 1955 and 1986 there is observable increased development of suburban stand alone dwellings where 'gaps' in the urban fabric are filled and local parks established. Tree canopies are more evident in 1986, however, they appear to largely only be located in the back yard of individual lots. In 2021 the tree canopy is much more substantial in the streets and local parks. This may be the fruits of planting that occurred in the 1980s and 1990s.

Between 1986 and 2021 aerial imagery it is evident that individual lots have been demolished and rebuilt as new dwellings due to the diversity in roof colour. Where it was once predominately terracotta tiling, there are many more coloured corrugated iron roofs. Nevertheless, the subdivision pattern appears largely unchanged throughout.



1.5 Social values and aspirations

Concord West is an established suburban area with a distinctive family-friendly feel, largely accredited to its proximity to parks, the foreshore as well as access to local amenities and transport. The LCA investigation area's proximity to local landmarks and open spaces, such as Concord Hospital, Lady Dame Edith Estate, Rivendell School and the Kokoda trail are all significant attractors that contribute to the community's sense of place, as well as drawing people in from other parts of the Canada Bay Local Government Area (LGA).

Digital insights into the way the broader population of Sydney and Australia view the LCA investigation area and can also provide an image of how the area is used and perceived. The manner in which information is sought in current times is predominantly reliant on the internet and social media, as perceptions are shaped by rising trends and popularity on digital platforms.

Google keyword searches, trend analytics and image popularity can provide quick insights into overall community sentiment about a place and its associations. Google image search results of Concord West are focused on the local heritage, housing, as well as the prominent train station and transport amenity. Image-sharing platforms such as Instagram are also able to showcase different qualities of the area and highlight the more social aspects. For Concord West, this is concentrated around the different local business (e.g. gyms and hairdressers) that greatly contribute to the community, as well as the participation in active recreation.


The adjacent diagram captures some of the values and aspirations of the residents of Concord West, received as part of the Community Survey conducted in August 2021. Community insights have revealed that the local activity most enjoyed within the LCA investigation area is heavily centred and active and passive recreation, with activities focused around walking, visiting local parks and outdoor activities with pets or children.

The most desired qualities for the future of the LCA investigation area remain largely similar to the most common activities that currently occur in the area, centred around safety and access to local amenities. Other aspirations include improving the quality of footpaths, and increasing opportunities for community connection, exercise and relaxation.



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1.9 Character, context and culture

Demographics

The age structure for the Concord-North Strathfield LCA investigation area reflects its nature as a low density residential area. The median age for the LCA investigation area is 42 years old, with 21.3%% falling within the 35-49 years age bracket. 8% fall between the 18-24 age bracket, indicating many relocate out of the area. The average household size for the LCA investigation area is 2.96, which in conjunction with the median age and low percentage of young adults residing in the area, indicates households are smaller at present. 44% are home owner's in the LCA investigation area, which sits higher than the total for Greater Sydney (27.7%) further demonstrating the demographic profile being predominantly middle-aged residents at present.

Across the greater Concord area, larger household sizes of 4 people and above are the emerging dominant group at 22.1%, comparative to 18.1% for Greater Sydney, with the increase in families relocating to the area. The LCA investigation areas proximity to local and accessible resources, define the character of the area. Whilst it is presently favoured by middle-aged residents, the overarching emergence of larger household sizes (4+) for the greater Concord area, indicates the precinct is attracting larger quantities of families. The number of residents cycling to work is at 0.23%, and is indicative of the limited cycle pathways. Improved connectivity would encourage this figure to increase

Character and culture


Concord-North Strathfield is located to the north of Parramatta Road, and is accessible to green spaces such as Henley Park and Central Park, and sits adjacent to Major's Bay Town Centre. The area is also situated in close proximity to North Strathfield and its associated railway station.

The suburb of Concord takes its name from the city of Concord, Massachusetts in the USA, which was the site of the Battle of Concord, one of the first military engagements of the American Revolutionary War (1775–1778). Some historians believe the Sydney suburb was named Concord in order to encourage a peaceful attitude between soldiers and settlers. The first land grants in the area were made in 1793.

The original Concord Council was established in 1883. It was later amalgamated with Drummoyne Council in 2000 after 117 years of self governance to form the City of Canada Bay. Concord is also the name for the surrounding parish.

Concord Bowling Club is a well-known establishment in the LCA investigation area. Built in the 1930s and located in beautiful leafy surrounds, the institution has been a meeting place for the local community for almost a century.


1.10 Context Analysis

Streets and interface



Key findings

- Wide streets with generous setbacks comprise much of the LCA investigation area, particularly to the north.
 Development is largely set back by at least 4m across most of the LCA investigation area, allowing for wide verges and large street trees to be retained
- Generally low fence lines of varying construction and materiality can be found throughout the LCA investigation area, allowing for good passive surveillance and a positive street interface

- The LCA investigation area is comprised of a network of predominantly local streets
- A number of major roads run through the LCA investigation area that also function as key public transport routes for buses. North Strathfield Station is located in close proximity to the west of the LCA investigation area

- Tree-lined streets remain a prominent aspect of the LCA assessment boundary, with a large quantity present within the area. Streets such as Links Avenue and Castlereagh Street have a dense, consistent canopy that function as a green link between open spaces.
- Distant views to Burwood centre can be found looking south along Flavelle Street.



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1.16 Character, context and culture

Demographics

Concord North LCA investigation area is located to the east of Majors Bay Road and Concord Golf Club. The LCA investigation area does not have any green space, however, is in proximity to smaller public open areas. The area is relatively connected with regular bus intervals providing accessibility for residents, however only 16.2% of residents use active transport in the LCA investigation area.

The median age sits higher above the Greater Sydney average of 36, with a large percentage of high-income households in the area. With 47% of people being home owner's and 87% of dwellings are a separate house type, the character of the area is clearly established as low density to accommodate for couples and emerging families.

Character and culture

The suburb of Concord takes its name from the city of Concord, Massachusetts in the USA, which was the site of the Battle of Concord, one of the first military engagements of the American Revolutionary War (1775–1778). Some historians believe the Sydney suburb was named Concord in order to encourage a peaceful attitude between soldiers and settlers. The first land grants in the area were made in 1793.

The original Concord Council was established in 1883. It was later amalgamated with Drummoyne Council in 2000 after 117 years of self governance to form the City of Canada Bay. Concord is also the name for the surrounding parish.

Concord North is situated in close proximity to the Majors Bay Road shopping precinct, which includes several cafes, restaurants, a large supermarket and other commercial enterprises. It contains and is close to key community offerings, such as Mortlake Public School, and the Concord Golf Club.

From 1901-1948, Concord was also served by a tram line, which connected Mortlake and Cabarita junction, through Majors Bay Road in Concord, to Burwood Road (formerly Wharf Street on the Concord side of Parramatta Road) south to Burwood town centre.





1.18 Local Character Area (LCA) development

Observations:

The evolution of the character area in recent history is shown through historic aerial imagery, from 1955, 1986 and 2021 respectively. Between 1955 and 1986 there was minimal development as the local area was largely established. Tree canopies are more evident in 1986, however, they appear to largely only be located in the

back yard of individual lots. In 2021 the tree canopy is much more substantial in the streets and local parks. This may be the fruits of planting that occurred in the 1980s and 1990s.

1986 Satellite Imagery

Between 1986 and 2021 aerial imagery it is evident that individual lots have demolished and rebuilt new dwellings due to the diversity in roof colour. Where it was once predominately terracotta tiling, there are many more coloured corrugated iron roofs. Nevertheless, the subdivision pattern appears largely unchanged throughout.





1.22 Local Character Area Boundary Assessment

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Concord East (CE)

2.1 Character, context and culture

Demographics

The Concord East LCA investigation area is located between Massey Park Golf Club and St Luke's Park. The LCA investigation area does not have any green space within the area itself. However, is located in close proximity to neighbouring parks. The LCA investigation area has a median age of 43, which is higher than the Greater Sydney average. The largest number of residents fall between the 35-39 age bracket (22%), and the area has an average household size of 2.9, indicating the area is dominated by younger couples and emerging families. With 50.6% of the population in the LCA investigation area having home ownership and 85% of the dwelling types are separate houses, it is evident the area is established as a low-density precinct.

Character and culture

The suburb of Concord takes its name from the city of Concord, Massachusetts in the USA, which was the site of the Battle of Concord, one of the first military engagements of the American Revolutionary War (1775–1778). Some historians believe the Sydney suburb was named Concord in order to encourage a peaceful attitude between soldiers and settlers. The first land grants in the area were made in 1793.

The original Concord Council was established in 1883. It was later amalgamated with Drummoyne Council in 2000 after 117 years of self governance to form the City of Canada Bay. Concord is also the name for the surrounding parish.

The Bushells factory is a key landmark that can be glimpsed in many parts of the LCA investigation area. It is located on the south side of the harbour, as the river moves west towards Parramatta. Before colonial intervention, the peninsula had previously been woodland on the higher ground with mangroves by the water's edge. The colonial claims on the land saw that this area was filled in for the purposes of industry.

Golf courses and parks now dominate the surroundings of Concord East, as well as estates of apartments and townhouses that have replaced the timber mill and the metalworks that had also once operated near by the water. The Bushells factory dominates the headland, a symbol of industrialisation both in the immediate sense of the changes to this land, and in the wider history of tea as a commodity.





Canada Bay (CB)

3.14 Character, context and culture

Demographics

The Canada Bay LCA investigation area is located to the north of Queens Road, between Cintra Park and Barnwell Park Golf Club. The character area is relatively small and is reasonably accessible with public transport with 17.4% of residents using active transport methods. The median age for the area is higher than the Greater Sydney average, indicating that a middle-aged demographic resides in the precinct. Of the different age brackets, the highest quantity falls between the 35–49-year-old at 23% compared to the 18-24 bracket at 9%. Indicatively, the LCA investigation area attracts a higher age demographic, 30% of which are homeowners. Whilst over half the LCA investigation area is characterised by separate house dwelling types, establishing a lowdensity area, there is a smaller percentage of high-income households and household sizes. This suggests that there are smaller households compared to neighbouringareas.

Character and culture

Following the Lower Canada Rebellion of 1837 to 1838 in British-controlled Lower Canada (now Quebec Province), French Canadian exiles were sent to Australia and imprisoned in trenches on a site in Sydney, known as Longbottom Stockade. These convicts broke stone for the construction of Parramatta Road and collected oyster shells for making lime. Exile Bay, France Bay and Canada Bay were named in recognition of these French-Canadians occupying our shores. Concord Oval now resides on the land where Longbottom Stockade originally housed the people exiled from Canada.

Before Canada Bay was established as the suburb it is today, the area was largely rural, with the district around Five Dock and Drummoyne occupied by family-run dairies. Cows roamed the paddocks from the 1890s through to the 1940s, until increased urban growth transformed the environment into one that was unsustainable for farming. Canada Bay today is a quiet, suburban neighbourhood close to the waterfront nestled between district level open space and recreational facilities, the natural landscape lending a big part to its streetscape and character.



and popularity on digital platforms.




3.20 Local Character Area Boundary Assessment

Context analysis, community insights and the experiential research undertaken have all aided in the identification of elements to be maintained in the Local Character Area. The LCA investigation area boundaries have been reviewed in light of the above processes, aided by additional layers of ground-truthing and further analysis that have identified other areas that contribute to character, or areas that detract from character that may prompt an exclusion.

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2.15 Character, context and culture

Demographics

The Wareemba West LCA investigation area is located to the west of Great North Road and has direct views to the foreshore. The character area is small, with a lower population of 799 people. There is no open green space within the LCA investigation area, however it is located north of Halliday Park, and has existing foreshore walkways for public use. The median age is higher than that of the Greater Sydney average, with 21% within the 35-49 age bracket. With over 75% of the dwelling types in the area identified as separate houses, and almost half with home ownership, the LCA investigation area has been defined as a quiet residential area of a low density. The current household size of 2.69, demonstrates that households are not overly dense, with only 37.3% being 4 or more bedrooms. It is evident that the demographic profile at present is comprised of smaller household sizes of middleaged residents.

Character and culture

Wareemba is considered the smallest suburb in Sydney by land area. Situated between Five Dock in the north and Abbotsford in the south, Wareemba sits on the eastern shore of Hen and Chicken Bay. Wareemba was originally going to be used as the suburb name for Five Dock in 1922, in a campaign led by real estate agents. However, at a council poll in December 1922, the vote went in favour of keeping the name Five Dock. The name Wareemba was later used as the subdivision between Five Dock and Abbotsford, and was officially declared a separate suburb in 1993. Wareemba is the Aboriginal name for Drummoyne Peninsula meaning "where sweet water meets salt water."

The promenade along Hen and Chicken Bay that runs through Wareemba is a popular walking track, with the bay itself often used for rowing regattas. The seawall along the bay was constructed in the 1930s to make room for residential development. Wareemba is located close to the shopping precinct on Great North Road, providing key local amenities of what is a tightly held suburban area.







2.22 Character, context and culture

Demographics

The Russell Lea LCA investigation area is located to the north and south of Lyons Road. The LCA investigation area has one small open green space, however, located in close proximity to Five Dock Park. There is adequate accessibility within the area, with 18.3% of residents using active transport to access services. The median age falls above the Greater Sydney average, demonstrating the large majority of residents are within the middle age bracket. Of the dwelling types within the area, 74% are identified as separate houses, further establishing the character of the precinct as one that is focussed on low density residential dwellings. The LCA investigation area residents are afluent, with 35.4% of households identified as high income. The relationship between the large population within the LCA investigation area and the household size of 2.8 indicate that the area is emerging as a guiet residential precinct for young families. This is further demonstrated with 25% of the households accommodating 4 or more people.

Character and culture

Sandwiched between Five Dock and Drummoyne, the broader suburb of Russell Lea hugs the western shores of Iron Cove and is filled with many Federation homes and post war cottages.

The suburb derives its name from one of the area's earliest settlers, Russell Barton, a successful miner and politician in the NSW state parliament. During his time in parliament (1880-1886), Barton was said to have built a grand residence, also known as Russell Lea, in the centre of where the suburb now lies. When the house was demolished, the area was subdivided and the suburb was established. At the time of subdivision, the auctioneers Hardie & Gorman promoted Russell Lea as a convenient location 'between two trams'.

A key feature within the Russell Lea LCA investigation area is the Russell Lea Public School. Enjoying a high reputation because of its community atmosphere, it draws students from a large area within the immediate suburbs as well as many out-of-area students. The old two-storeyed main building has been demolished to make way for modern three-storey main building, library, canteen and communal hall, set in a secure, native bush garden environment.





2.26 Social values and aspirations

Russell Lea is a well-stablished part of the Canada Bay LGA that is largely inter-generational, with a strong family-friendly nature and sense of community. The cultural diversity, ease of access and suburban nature of the area are its most strong associations, further reinforced by its proximity to local amenities, parks and schools.

Digital insights into the way the broader population of Sydney and Australia view the LCA investigation area and its surroundings can also provide an image of how the area is used and perceived. The manner in which information is sought in current times is predominantly reliant on the internet and social media, as perceptions are shaped by rising trends and popularity on digital platforms.

Google keyword searches, trend analytics and image popularity can provide quick insights into overall community sentiment about a place and its associations. Google image search results of the suburb feature much of the housing in the area, as well as the prevailing views available across the water. The recent renovation of Russell Lea Public School is also common, suggesting its value as a key community anchor and the importance of the school to the local residents. Image-sharing platforms such as Instagram are also able to showcase different qualities of the area. For Russell Lea, this is heavily focused around both existing and future housing developments, suggesting that the area is

undergoing much change and transformation.

The adjacent diagram captures some of the values and aspirations of the residents of Canada Bay, received as part of the Community Survey conducted in August 2021. Community insights have revealed that the local acitivity most enjoyed within the LCA investigation area is heavily centred around active recreation and nature-related activities, conducive to the LCA investigation area's waterfront location.

The most desired qualities for the future of the LCA investigation area remain largely similar to the most common activities that currently occur in the area, centred around safety and increasing the amount of tree planting in the area. Other aspirations include connections to other suburbs, improving foreshore connections and encouraging more arts and creative activities.

2.28 Local Character Area Boundary Assessment

Context analysis, community insights and the experiential research undertaken have all aided in the identification of elements to be maintained in the Local Character Area. The LCA proposed boundaries have been reviewed in light of the above processes, aided by additional layers of ground-truthing and further analysis that have identified other areas that contribute to character, or areas that detract from character that may prompt an exclusion.

The proposed LCA boundaries have also been measured against the principles outlined in Section 1.8, ensuring that any additional inclusions or exclusions are aligned with the overall vision for the LCA. The combination of the above processes has also ensured that all the elements of character are considered from a social, economic and environmental perspective.

The additional areas to be included or excluded as part of the LCA boundary are highlighted in the adjacent diagram, as well as the associated justifications for doing so.

Proposed LCA boundary #2: Areas south of Lyons Road have a distinct intimacy to the streets with narrow widths, well-maintained verges and consistent setbacks and fence lines. The undulating topography also sets it apart from the northern portion of Russell Lea.

2.29 Character, context and culture

Demographics

The Croker Estate LCA investigation area is located to the east of Great North Road and north of Henley Marine Drive. The LCA investigation area is the smallest of the sites in terms of area and has a population of 693. The median age for the LCA investigation area is 35 years and falls below the Greater Sydney average, indicating that a relatively younger demographic. The area has adequate access to transport, with over 28% using these services. Comparative to other LCAs, the CRE has a lower percentage of separate house dwelling types, and a household size of 2.72 indicates potential for households to increase.

Character and culture

The urban character of Croker Estate dates back to the first subdivision of Five Dock Farm in 1837, when land was subdivided into large lots and later into even smaller building lots. The character area is now known for California Bungalow style housing and tree-lined streets.

Croker Park is a key open space located within the LCA investigation area, with spaces for active recreation as well as play facilities for children. Tennis courts and sports facilities can be found further to south of the park.

The main retail/commercial focus for this LCA investigation area is the Five Dock Town Centre which is located approximately 500m north of the area. A secondary small cluster of local shops is situated on the corner of Harrabrook Avenue and Ramsay Road to the south-east of the area.



2.31 Local Character Area (LCA) development

Observations:

The evolution of the character area in recent history is shown through historic aerial imagery, from 1955, 1986 and 2021 respectively. Between 1955 and 1986 there is minimal change in the local area. Tree canopies are more evident in 1986, however, they appear to largely only be located in the back yard of individual lots. In 2021 the tree canopy is much more substantial in the streets and local parks. This may be the fruits of planting that occurred in the 1980s and 1990s.

Between 1986 and 2021 aerial imagery it is evident that a few individual lots have demolished and rebuilt new dwellings or renovated due to a greater diversity in roof colour. However, a prevailing majority remain terracotta and the subdivision pattern appears unchanged throughout.

2.36 Character, context and culture

Overview

The Five Dock North LCA investigation area is located to the east of Great North Road and has an area of 6.07ha. The LCA investigation area has a population of 578, which is reasonable relative to its small size. The median age for the area is above the Greater Sydney average at 42 years. The area is located in proximity to Five Dock Town Centre, and as such has good public transport access, with 22.2% using this service. Of the households within the area, 38.5% are a separate house dwelling type, which is lower comparative to other character areas. The household size is relatively low at 2.24, with 12.3% of households accommodating 4 or more people. Relative to the median age, this indicates that a large majority of the households are couples, with the potential for this size to grow.

Character and culture

Five Dock experienced rapid population growth as transport facilities were enhanced in the 1800s. In 1836, Five Dock was serviced by the "Emu", the area's first ferry service. However the greatest catalyst for population rise was the installation of the tramway system in 1890, which has since been dismantled.

From the early 1900s through to the 1930s, a significant number of Italian immigrants, specifically from the Aeolian Islands in Sicily, moved to the local area. As a result, Five Dock and its neighbouring suburbs were enriched by Italian culture, food stores, and restaurants. This remains significant to the local identity and character of Five Dock.

The local Italian culture is an integral part of the identity of Five Dock, with events such as the Ferragosto festival integral in bringing the community together and function as a key contributor to the richness of street life.





2.42 Local Character Area Boundary Assessment

2.43 Character, context and culture

Overview

The Five Dock LCA investigation area is located between Five Dock Park and Timbrell Park, with a higher population of 1,980. The LCA investigation area is well connected to Five Dock Town Centre, with a 22% of residents using active transport methods making the area accessible. The median age for the LCA investigation area is higher than the Greater Sydney average, indicating a higher quantity of middle-aged residents reside in the area. Of the households within Five Dock LCA investigation area, over 73% are of a separate house dwelling type, which establishes the area as low density, and demonstrates its existing small-scale, detached residential character. Over 30% of the dwellings accommodate 4 or more people, with the household size at 2.8, indicating the density is still relatively low at present, but has the potential to increase as family demographics within the area grow. A high percentage of residents in the LCA investigation area are home owners (42.3%) and a large number of households are identified as high income (39%), further indicating the demographic of the area as one that is predominantly middle aged.


Character and culture

Five Dock possesses a unique location between two large, accessible open spaces with high levels of amenity, as well as its proximity to the Five Dock Town Centre. Both Five Dock Park and Timbrell Park are key contributors to the character of the LCA investigation area, providing opportunities for community connection and providing residents with access to the waterfront. Active recreation for people of all ages and abilities is a central aspect of the LCA investigation area, with recent developments in the adjacent open spaces providing opportunities for inclusive recreational activities.

Australia's first truly all-abilities playground, Livvi's Place at Timbrell Park, is designed for children with differing physical and neurological abilities. Its purpose is to "cater for a broad range of special needs in a responsible and respectful manner including mobility, vision and hearing impairments as well as spectrum disorders, such as autism, to provide for both physical and emotional needs regardless of age or ability." In doing so, Livvi's Place aims to "dramatically reduce the barriers experienced by children with special needs, thereby

2.44 Context Analysis

Streets and interface



Key findings

- There is significant variation in the consistency of street setback throughout Five Dock, possibly due to the amount of recent construction that is rapidly transforming the area e.g. parts of First Avenue and Rickard Street.
- Largest setbacks can be found to the south-west of the LCA investigation area, in areas that display more consistent rows of traditional residences, allowing for a more prominent tree canopy to develop.

Movement and access



Key findings

- The LCA investigation area is comprised of a network of quiet, local streets with little transport options, with the exception of First Avenue which contains a number of bus stops.

2.45 Local Character Area (LCA) development

Observations:

The evolution of the character area in recent history is shown through historic aerial imagery, from 1955, 1986 and 2021 respectively. Between 1955 and 1986 there is minimal change in the development pattern of the local area. Tree canopies are more evident in 1986, however, they appear to largely only be located in the back yard of individual lots. In 2021 the tree canopy is much more substantial in the streets and local parks. This may be the fruits of planting that occurred in the 1980s and 1990s.

Between 1986 and 2021 aerial imagery it is evident that individual lots have

demolished and rebuilt new dwellings due to the diversity in roof colour. Where it was once predominately terracotta tiling, there are many more coloured corrugated iron roofs. Nevertheless, the subdivision pattern appears largely unchanged throughout.

2.47 Social values and aspirations

Five Dock is most strongly associated with its proximity to the retail and commercial centre along Great North Road, evoking images of its strong sense of cultural pride derived from its diverse local community. Community sentiment regards the area as a largely quiet, friendly neighbourhood despite its unassuming nature.

Digital insights into the way the broader population of Sydney and Australia view the LCA investigation area and its surroundings can also provide an image of how the area is used and perceived. The manner in which information is sought in current times is predominantly reliant on the internet and social media, as perceptions are shaped by rising trends and popularity on digital platforms.

Google keyword searches, trend analytics and image popularity can provide quick insights into overall community sentiment about a place and its associations. Google image search results of the area are highly concentrated on the nearby retail and commercial amenities, as well as the cultural events that have come to define the local community e.g. the Ferragusto Festival. Image-sharing platforms such as Instagram are also able to showcase different gualities of the area and highlights the more social aspects of the LCA investigation area. Local food and beverage offerings,

surrounding active recreation opportunities as well as small comunity businesses feature strongly in this form of digital engagement.

The adjacent diagram captures some of the values and aspirations of the residents of Canada Bay, received as part of the Community Survey conducted in August 2021. Community insights have revealed that the local acitivity most enjoyed within the LCA investigation area is heavily centred around walking and visiting local parks in the area. The familyfriendly nature of the area is also reinforced by the love of chatting to neighbours and passers-by.

The most desired qualities for the future of the LCA investigation area are centred around increased offerings for families to engage in play and active recreation. Other aspirations and values include improved access and safety, as well as street trees for shade and comfort.



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2.50 Character, context and culture

Demographics

The Rodd Point LCA investigation area is located to the west of Henley Marine Drive, with an area of 17.89ha. The LCA investigation area is accessible predominantly by bus service, with over 21% using transport modes. The median age is above the Greater Sydney average, demonstrating the dominance of the middle-aged bracket within the area. The LCA investigation area has the highest number of detatched dwelling typology, at 99%, establishing the detached, lowdensity nature of the area. The household size within the area is at 2.72, with 28.5% of households accommodating 4 or more bedrooms, indicating that the housing types within the area have the potential to accommodate the growth of young families. A large quantity of the population in the LCA investigation area are homeowners, with 44.3% being identified as high income households, further indicating the higher age demographic.

Character and culture

Situated along Iron Cove, Rodd Point is one of Sydney's smallest suburbs, and is situated along Iron Cove. Known for its parklands and walking tracks, it is a popular weekend picnic destination for families. The suburb was named for the Rodd family - prominent local identities - and includes land bought by Brent Clements Rodd (1809–1898) from the Five Dock Farm estate in 1836. Many of the local streets are named after members of the Rodd family, including Brent, Brisbane, Burnell, Clements, Janet, Lenore, Trevanion and Undine. Barnstaple Road takes its name from Barnstaple Manor, Rodd's family home.

The Bay Run is a prominent attractor in and around Rodd Point, and is considered one of Sydney's most popular running and walking tracks. It consists of a 7km walkway and cycleway around the edge of Iron Cove, with consistent views to the water at all times. A large part of the run runs alongside the waterside boundary of Rodd Point and many users start and finish in the suburb.



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

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
